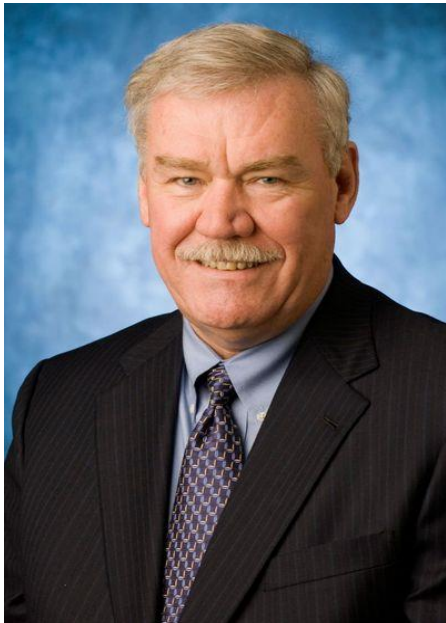


**An Evening with Horace Hamilton to Learn about

In the early 2000's he made the switch to digital and the in 2013, after retirement, he became much more active in photography as a student of photography and a serious nature photographer. He started what is now one of the largest chapters of the GNPA in Lawrenceville and shortly after became the President of GNPA. Horace is currently very active with the club serving as Past

President on the board and providing support in many areas of the association both as leader, coach, and judge. His passion and experience as a photographer and judge extend beyond the GNPA where he has also served to jury many other photographic competitions in and around Georgia.

Horace is sought after by other photography clubs for not only his knowledgeable approach to photography but his excellence as a teacher. Horace's primary photography interest continues to be the beautiful photo opportunities of the Smoky Mountains, leading groups annually to shoot elk, sunrises/sunsets, and many other of his favorite locations in this beautiful National Park. Horace will provide two segments to his photography presentation this evening. First, he will review the elements of an excellent image as seen through the eye of the judges. He will discuss the considerations you should make when entering a photo competition that will give you a better chance to be viewed positively in a juried event.

Second, he will spend the balance of the evening reviewing and critiquing the 40+ photographs that were selected for the Fernbank gallery as part of the Migratory Bird Event held at Fernbank in May. This gallery is still on display and will be available to review until August 1st.
